

How to make a tumble trap





What you need:

- an old yoghuve pot, jam jar or tub
- a cover an old slate, tile or bit of flat wood



- · bait try cheese, bacon rind, bread or fruit 🚇 🔊 🔾 🥥
- · trowel for digging

- 1) Dig a hole in the ground with the trowel
- 2) Put the pot, jar or tub into the hole and fill the gaps around the edge with soil
- Bait your trap with your food to attract tiny Visitors

- 4) Use the slate, tile or bit of wood to stop the vain getting in - prop up with twigs or stones
- 5 Go away and wait
- 6) Inspect your tumble trap for minibeasts
- 7 Pack your trap away when you've finished


Make your own wormery







You will need:

- · Paper or card and tape

































Make your own wind vane







How to make a pooter







What you need:

· plasticine



jar with lid



- · 40cm of clear, flexible plastic tubing, 7-10cm Wide (try a big DIY stove)
- · a small piece of gauze, net curtains or tights
- elastic band




 green and red Stickers or tape



- Make 2 holes in the lid (ask an adult to help with this)
- 2 Cut 2 lengths of tubing about 15cm and 25cm long and poke them through the holes.
- 3 Put the gauze over the end of the shorter tube and mark the other end with a green sticker/ tape.

- 4 Mark the longer tube with a red sticker/tape (red means 'don't such this tube).
- 5) Put some plasticine around the tube holes to make them airtight.

How to help birds avoid windows

· thread or fishing line











You can find these on most shower puffs. Sketch a large bird shape on your card, and colour it in with your black pen. Cut it out.



(3) Hang the bird outside a window to break up reflections on the glass. It will also move in the wind.
















· Small margarine tub lid













· Bait - dog or cat food, peanut butter. mealwarms, seed etc








· Branches, rocks and leaves




Cut the top and bottom off the juice cartons so that they slide 🍄 together to create a tube.



Line the bottom with white paper and stick in place.



(3) Cut a thin, clean sponge to size and place inside the margarine tub lid. Soak with food colouring and slide it to the middle of the tunnel.




(4) Put bait in a bottle top, and place this on the sponge.



Put the tunnel along a wall, fence or hedge. Cover with rocks, leaves and branches.



(6) Leave overnight and check in the morning for prints.












You will need:


- 500ml pack of lime jelly
- Sachet of blackcurrant jelly












• Green grapes 0000



· I litre clear bowl

· Measuring jugs

· Sieve

· Scissors



Follow packet instructions to mix each colour of jelly in a jug. Allow jelly to cool (but not set) before pouring it into the bowl to create a new layer.

In your bowl, allow each new layer of jelly to set for an hour in the fridge before adding another layer.

LAYER FOUR

Half a pint of gelatine, add a few drops of blue food colouring

LAYER THREE


Remaining green jelly

LAYER TWO

Half the green jelly + two drops of blue food colouring

LAYER ONE

Make up the blackcurrant jelly, pour it into the bowl, and leave to set.



Add a chocolate frog near the spawn and enjoy!

A clump of chapped dragon fruit or tapiaca (fragspawn) with same sliced green grapes (lily pads).

Stick the remaining reed shapes upright into the jelly

Another layer of worms or bugs and half of reed shapes cut from the apple fruit bar

How to make an animal footprint trap





You will need:

· old baking tray



· long ruler



· water 0



· low-sided dish



· cat or dog food



· footprint ID guide




Fill an old baking tray with damp sand and smooth out the surface with a ruler.



Check to make sure your fingers leave a mark.

Leave the trap overnight in a garden and check in the morning for footprints left by curious visitors.



Place cat or dog food in a low-sided dish in the middle of the tray.



(you could also try seeds, peanuts or mealworms)

How to make your own bird feeder





What you need:

- dry ingredients

- · a fir cone, cocanut shell or yoghurt pot









plaster all over a fir





You will need:

- 2 cups of plain flour
- 99
- · I cup of salt



- I cup of water

 baking tray lined with parchment




- · oven or airing cupboard
- acrylic paint, varnish and brushes (optional)





Mix the flour, salt and water together until you have a dough that sticks together.



O Place your creature on a tray in an oven on a low heat until the dough is hard.



You could also use an airing cupboard or even a sunny window ledge. Use your hands to mould the dough into the shape of an animal.
 Use any tools you have to add finer detail.



When the dough has cooled, paint it and add a final layer


Mark and recapture garden snails






You will need:

- an area of garden or pond
- · tub or pot
- waterproof paint (non-toxic)




· pad and pen





8 snails

Place a tiny dot of paint on the shell of each snail. Don't let the paint touch their bodies, and don't use too much.



Small dot to avoid attracting predators

Release the snails back where you found them, and leave them for a few days. Return and do another search - count how many are with and without a paint spot.



You can work out how many snails might be living in your chosen area with this sum:

No. of snails in the area

No. of snails in first visit x No. in second visit

No. of marked snails in second visit



How to make a mini nature reserve





1 Choose your site

Choose a safe place to put your window box - somewhere like an old bench or wall at an easy height for inspection.

Gather your materials

- · window box · a small log
- yoghuvt pot
 some compost
- · a vock

3 Fill the box with compost

Always use peat-free compost and save our precious peat bogs.

4 Add a few features

Dig in the yoghurt pot and add the small log and rock.

6 Keepa diary

Record the changes you see. Make notes using guidebooks and take a photo every week

7 Management

Revioue out of control plants or cut them back with scissors.
