

Writing Practice

'Cause and effect connectives' - like because and so - link two parts of a sentence together. Adding a cause and effect connective allows you to explain something further or give a reason. Much better! For example:

1. An octopus can squeeze through tiny cracks. X

An octopus can squeeze through tiny cracks **because** it has no bones.

- 2. The blue whale came to the surface. X
 - The blue whale came to the surface **so** it could find food. \checkmark



Learn them, find out what they all mean, and organise your own test for Friday!


To help you learn them, maybe you can come up with sentences or stories that use the words, and share them with your family.
